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INTRODUCTION

Legislative Audit Commission Resolution Number 130 directed the Office of the Auditor General to develop an inventory of State Programs. The Resolution directed auditors to survey State agencies. This Supplement contains the **verbatim** response of the surveyed agencies. Nearly 100 State agencies listed approximately 1,750 programs in our survey (see Appendix C and D of the main report).

Generally, we used the following process to collect this data:

1. In 2005, we tried to identify a listing of programs from existing sources, such as by reviewing agency submissions to the State Comptroller for the Public Accountability Report and by examining the budget submissions to the Office of Management and Budget. The information in these sources, however, was not adequate to address the Resolution because agencies reported programs by categories, or reported programs in the form of organizational charts, or there was no specific information on programs.
2. In early 2006, we sent a notification letter to approximately 100 State agencies that the LAC wanted the Office of the Auditor General to develop an inventory of all State programs. At this point, we asked agencies to estimate the number of programs they administered, review and respond to a draft definition of the term “program,” and provide us the name of a contact person at the agency.
3. Later in 2006, we sent a survey questionnaire to the agency contact person which asked for specific information on programs administered by each agency. The survey included the following working definition of the term program for this project:

Programs are coordinated activities using government resources to provide services or to perform other functions that are intended to achieve defined policy objectives. Programs and the underlying policies may be established by federal or State constitution, statute, rule, regulation, executive order, agency, or court decision. Exclude programs designed to serve only internal administrative functions of your own agency (e.g., accounting, personnel, IT).

4. In spring 2007, we identified approximately 50 programs at 20 agencies that seemed to be similar, based on the descriptions provided by the agencies, and followed up on those programs. The results of this testing are included in the main report.

Below are the directions that we provided with the survey questionnaire for the agencies to use; the **footnotes** to columns in agencies’ responses refer to the following:
