INTRODUCTION

The Department of Military Affairs was established by the Military Code of Illinois (20 ILCS 1805 et seq.). The Department acts as the channel of communication between the federal government and the State of Illinois on all matters pertaining to the State Military. The Adjutant General prepares and executes plans for organizing, supplying, equipping, and mobilizing the Organized Militia for use in national defense, State defense, and emergencies.

FINDINGS, CONCLUSIONS, AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Department did not have adequate documentation or formal procedures in place to verify certain eligibility requirements (i.e. age, residence, not on parole or probation, etc.) for participants in the Lincoln Challenge program. This program was established as a 22 week boot camp program for high school dropouts. (Finding 2, page 12)

The Department stated that in the future accessible eligibility criteria will be validated. There is pending legislative action which will authorize the release of presently inaccessible eligibility criteria.

OTHER FINDINGS

Our report contained two additional findings. The Department has given proper attention to our recommendations. We will review the Department's progress towards implementation of our recommendations during our next audit.

AUDITORS' OPINION

The June 30, 1993 and 1994 financial statements of the Department of Military Affairs are fairly presented.
