INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

As Special Assistant Auditors for the Auditor General, we have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2005, which collectively comprise the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27, as of June 30, 2005, and the respective changes in financial position and cash flows, where applicable, thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued a report dated November 30, 2005 on our consideration of Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

The Management's Discussion and Analysis and the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund Schedule of Funding Progress on pages 30 to 35 and page 64 are not a required part of the basic financial

statements but are supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's basic financial statements. The combining and individual non-major fund financial statements, budgetary comparison schedules and Schedule of Disbursements to School District Treasurers and Other Entities are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by *Guidelines to Auditing and Reporting for a Regional Office of Education*, and is also not a required part of the basic financial statements. The combining and individual non-major fund financial statements, budgetary comparison schedules, Schedule of Disbursements to School District Treasurers and Other Entities and the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING AND ON COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS BASED ON AN AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

As Special Assistant Auditors for the Auditor General, we have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2005, which collectively comprise the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's basic financial statements and have issued our report thereon dated November 30, 2005. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting. However, we noted certain matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be reportable conditions. Reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design or operation of the internal control over financial reporting that, in our judgment, could adversely affect the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's ability to record, process, summarize and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the financial statements. Reportable conditions are described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs as items 05-2, 05-3, 05-4, and 05-5.

A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements caused by error or fraud in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control that might be reportable conditions and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses. However, we believe none of the reportable conditions described above is a material weakness.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we

performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*. However, we noted a certain immaterial instance of noncompliance which is required by the *Guidelines to Auditing and Reporting for a Regional Office of Education*, to be reported on the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs as item 05-1.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Auditor General, the General Assembly, the Legislative Audit Commission, the Governor, agency management, others within the organization, Illinois State Board of Education, federal awarding agencies and pass-through entities and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

REPORT ON COMPLIANCE WITH REQUIREMENTS APPLICABLE TO EACH MAJOR PROGRAM AND ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER COMPLIANCE FOR EACH PROGRAM DETERMINED TO BE MAJOR BY THE ILLINOIS STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION IN THEIR MONITORING OF FEDERAL PROGRAMS

Compliance

We have audited the compliance of Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 with the types of compliance requirements described in the *U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-133 Compliance Supplement* that are applicable to each of its major federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2005. The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's major federal programs are identified in the summary of auditors' results section of the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs. Compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants applicable to each of its major federal programs is the responsibility of the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's compliance based on our audit.

We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and OMB Circular A-133 criteria as required by the Guidelines to Auditing and Reporting for a Regional Office of Education. Those standards and criteria require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion. Our audit does not provide a legal determination of the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's compliance with those requirements.

In our opinion, the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 complied, in all material respects, with the requirements referred to above that are applicable to each of its major federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2005.

Internal Control Over Compliance

The management of the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants applicable to federal programs. In planning

and performing our audit, we considered the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's internal control over compliance with requirements that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on compliance and to test and report on the internal control over compliance in accordance with OMB Circular A-133 criteria as required by the Guidelines to Auditing and Reporting for a Regional Office of Education.

Our consideration of the internal control over compliance would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that noncompliance with applicable requirements of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants caused by error or fraud that would be material in relation to a major federal program being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over compliance and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Auditor General, the General Assembly, the Legislative Audit Commission, the Governor, agency management, others within the organization, Illinois State Board of Education, federal awarding agencies and pass-through entities and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements

FINDING NO. 05-1 - Controls Over Compliance with Laws and Regulations

Criteria/Specific Requirements:

The Illinois School Code 105 ILCS 5/3-14.11 states that the Regional Superintendent shall examine at least once each year all books, accounts, and vouchers of every school treasurer in his educational service region, and if he finds any irregularities in them, to report them at once, in writing, to the trustees in Class II county school units, to the respective school boards of those school districts which form a part of a Class II county school unit but which are not subject to the jurisdiction of the trustees of schools of any township in which any such district is located, or to the respective school boards of the district in Class I county school units whose duty it shall be to take immediately such action as the case demands.

This mandate has existed in its current form since at least 1953.

Condition:

Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 is not examining all books, accounts, and vouchers of every school treasurer in its educational service area at least once each year. Regional Office officials noted that they believe this mandate is outdated and that they are satisfying the intent of the statute by other reviews they undertake. For example, the Regional Superintendent signs off on the Annual Financial Reports from the school districts in his region. In addition, the Regional Office gets a spreadsheet from the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) that outlines all of the school districts and their audit exceptions, if any. The Regional Office follows up with school districts having exceptions and gets the corrective action and forwards it to ISBE.

While these are reviews involving the finances of school treasurers, they are not in the level of detail required by 105 ILCS 5/3-14.11.

Effect:

The Regional Office of Education No. 27 did not comply with statutory requirements.

Cause:

Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 management stated that the procedures currently being performed are deemed sufficient to comply with this mandate.

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements (Continued)

FINDING NO. 05-1 - Controls Over Compliance with Laws and Regulations (Continued)

Auditors' Recommendations:

The Regional Office of Education No. 27 should comply with the requirements of 105 ILCS 5/3-14.11. If the Regional Office believes the statutory mandate is obsolete or otherwise unnecessary, then it should seek legislative action to revise the statute accordingly.

Management's Response:

In 1953, there were 102 county superintendents and their duties were a lot less numerous than today. Few schools had budgets that exceeded \$500,000. Under such conditions, this law probably made sense. During the past 50+ years, various practices have evolved eliminating the need for this type of monitoring. In the 21st century, all schools have multimillion dollar budgets that are: 1.) audited annually by professionally certified outside auditing firms; 2.) audits are filed for public record and inspection; and 3.) this is tracked through the process by the procedures mentioned above in the section titled "Condition". Requiring the ROE's to do another review would be redundant, costly, and require the hiring of teams of new staff members in each ROE to carry out the task. The latter begs the question of which level(s) of government would bear the cost to carry out this task and how costly might that be to reinstitute the practice?

We are grateful for the OAG's assistance in calling this to our collective attention because it provides the Regional Offices of Education with additional justification to request that the General Assembly delete this and other obsolete sections from the statutes. We will seek a legislative solution to this and other obsolete passages.

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements (Continued)

FINDING NO. 05-2 - Inadequate controls over property and equipment (Repeated from 2004 and 2003 - Finding Nos. 04-3, 03-3)

Criteria/Specific Requirements:

The Regional Office of Education (ROE) Accounting Manual requires each ROE to maintain detailed fixed asset records for both accounting purposes as well as insurance purposes, for fixed assets costing \$500 or more. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles require that an inventory of all fixed assets and depreciation schedules for assets meeting the capitalization threshold for reporting be maintained.

The ROE Accounting Manual also states that the fixed asset inventory records should include: the inventory control number (tag number); major asset class; function and activity; reference to the acquisition source document; acquisition date; vendor; a short description of the asset; unit charged with custody; location; fund and account from which purchased; method of acquisition; estimated useful life and method of depreciation; estimated salvage value; and date, method, and authorization of disposition.

In addition, sound internal controls require that policies and procedures on fixed assets should cover acquisition and tagging, recording and reporting, depreciation (if applicable), transfers and dispositions, and annual physical inventory, and that they should be formally documented and consistently applied.

Condition:

The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 did not have adequate controls over fixed assets.

In our test of fixed assets at the local ROE office, we did not locate two cameras on the fixed assets listing. Upon investigation, it was determined that personnel attending seminars had them, however, the items were not signed out in the log-out sheet.

In our test of fixed assets at the Progressive Alternative Secondary School (PASS) location, we noted the following:

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements (Continued)

FINDING NO. 05-2 - Inadequate controls over property and equipment (Repeated from 2004 and 2003 - Finding Nos. 04-3, 03-3) (Continued)

- The fixed assets listing did not have complete information as to the function and activity; reference to the acquisition source document; acquisition date; acquisition cost; vendor; unit charged with custody; location; fund and account from which purchased; and method of acquisition.
- Equipment items were not tagged with fixed asset tag numbers that clearly indicated they were the property of the ROE. Some items had numbers written in permanent ink.

Effect:

The absence of a sound system of internal controls over fixed assets can result in inaccurate reporting of fixed assets and inadequate physical control for equipment items. An incomplete fixed asset listing does not provide an adequate basis for physical control and losses may occur without being detected.

Cause:

The Regional Office management stated that the exceptions noted in the local ROE office were isolated incidents. Fixed asset policies and procedures have not been implemented at the PASS office due to lack of staff.

Auditors' Recommendation:

The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 should adhere to its fixed asset policy and procedures manual to effectively and efficiently monitor property acquisitions, transfers and disposals, and provide for accurate reporting of fixed asset balances.

The fixed asset listing should be completed to include all the details required by the ROE Accounting Manual and should be checked for accuracy and existence through an annual physical inventory. A reconciliation should be performed between the fixed asset listing and the recorded capital outlay expenditures for the year. All reconciling items should be disposed of in a timely manner.

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements (Continued)

FINDING NO. 05-2 - Inadequate controls over property and equipment (Repeated from 2004 and 2003 - Finding Nos. 04-3, 03-3) (Continued)

Management's Response:

We agree with the recommendations. A sign-out sheet has been updated to allow for numerous sign-outs. Staff has been informed of the importance of signing-out. Inventory will be tested semi annually to increase control. PASS will obtain permanent labels to be affixed to all equipment. An inventory will be taken annually. In addition, a spreadsheet will be created that includes item descriptions, ID number, funding source, cost, disposal date, reason for disposal and method item was disposed.

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements (Continued)

FINDING NO. 05-3 - Unrecorded and unreconciled bank accounts (Repeated from 2004 and 2003 - Finding Nos. 04-5 and 03-5)

Criteria/Specific Requirements:

Sound internal controls require that accounting records accurately and completely record all transactions of the entity. Balances in the general ledger accounts should be reconciled with statement of accounts on a regular basis and adjustments recorded timely and correctly in the books of accounts.

Condition:

During our testing of cash and bank reconciliations, we noted four bank accounts with balances totaling \$125,632 as of June 30, 2005 not recorded in the general ledger. These accounts were opened in prior years and were included in the cash balances reported in the financial statements but the adjustments were not posted in the general ledger.

The bank reconciliation as of June 30, 2005 for one bank account with a bank balance of \$81,198 reflected an unreconciled difference of \$1,378.

Effect:

Failure to record bank accounts in the general ledger results in inaccurate financial reporting and increases the risk of undetected misappropriation of assets. Unreconciled and unresolved differences in bank reconciliations render the bank reconciliation process ineffective to identify improper and unauthorized cash transactions.

Cause:

The bank accounts established in prior years remain unrecorded, as the Regional Office staff was not aware of the proper journal entries to record these balances. The unreconciled difference in one account was due to staff not having sufficient time to investigate the difference.

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements (Continued)

FINDING NO. 05-3 - Unrecorded and unreconciled bank accounts (Repeated from 2004 and 2003 - Finding Nos. 04-5 and 03-5) (Continued)

Auditors' Recommendation:

The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 should immediately record these bank accounts in the General Ledger and properly account for all transactions of these accounts in the books. Bank reconciliations should be performed on all bank accounts on a regular basis and differences identified should be investigated promptly.

Management's Response:

We agree with the recommendations. The ROE will establish QuickBooks accounts for the accounts not currently set-up and recorded. PASS will assign codes using the chart of accounts in the ROE Accounting Manual and track all income and expenses.

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements (Continued)

FINDING NO. 05-4 - Inadequate documentation of salary rates (Repeated from 2004 and 2003 - Finding Nos. 04-6 and 03-6)

Criteria/Specific Requirements:

The Regional Office of Education (ROE) Accounting Manual general policies concerning payroll procedures state that a master record should be maintained on each employee or contractor for federal and state reporting purposes. The master payroll record should contain at least the following: employee name, social security number, address, date of hire, rate and terms of contract/agreement. In addition, sound internal controls require that payroll rates and amounts be properly authorized and formally documented.

Condition:

In our tests of payroll for the PASS Alternative School, we noted that employees did not have employment contracts or formally approved rates of pay. A list of salaries by person is prepared and given to the bookkeeper but the listing does not indicate the person authorizing the salary rates or their effective dates.

Effect:

Inadequate documentation of salary rates may result in unauthorized and inaccurate payroll computations. Absence of an employee contract and formal authorization of salary rates may also result in disputes over salary calculations.

Cause:

The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's staff stated that the budgeted salary costs in the programs represent the authorized salary rates and additional documentation was not considered necessary since these employees are normally the program managers.

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements (Continued)

FINDING NO. 05-4 - Inadequate documentation of salary rates (Repeated from 2004 and 2003 - Finding Nos. 04-6 and 03-6) (Continued)

Auditors' Recommendation:

The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 should develop employment documentation that would include the authorized payroll rates for a specific period including benefits accruing to the employee. This form should be signed by the Superintendent and the employee. Any changes in rates, benefits and contract period should be formally updated.

Management's Response:

We agree with the recommendations. An excel spreadsheet with all the staff, rates, and effective dates will be established. This will be signed by the Regional Superintendent. Individual staff payroll information will be signed by the staff member and the coordinator. Individual staff files will be established with current monthly payroll information and paperwork indicating additional funds for special work services given to staff.

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements: (Continued)

FINDING NO. 05-5 - Inadequate Chart of Accounts (Repeated from 2004 - Finding 04-7)

Criteria/Specific Requirements:

Title 23 Illinois Administrative Code: Education and Cultural Resources, Chapter I, Section 525.160, Fiscal Procedures requires the Regional Superintendent of Schools in each Regional Office of Education to maintain accurate financial records in accordance with 23 Illinois Administrative Code 110 Program Accounting Manual and Regional Office of Education (ROE) Accounting Manual, as applicable. The manual requires the Regional Office of Education No. 27 to track funding sources as Federal, State, or Local.

Condition:

The system of accounts maintained by the Regional Office of Education No. 27 does not correspond with the system of accounts promulgated by the Illinois State Board of Education in the Illinois Program Accounting Manual and ROE Accounting Manual. The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 maintains its system of accounts based on the grants, awards and contracts (programs) it administers. Programs are not maintained in individual separate self-balancing funds. Instead, programs are set-up as cost centers that track only revenues and expenditures by program. In addition, revenues are accounted for using a single revenue code for each program, without regard to the source of the revenue. We also noted that the account descriptions used and the account coding are not consistent in all funds.

Effect:

Funding sources are not reported in accordance with the Illinois Program Accounting Manual and ROE Accounting Manual. Financial reports prepared by the ROE require additional analysis and dissemination in order to be comparable and consistent with the requirements of the Illinois State Board of Education and other State and Federal agencies.

Cause:

The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 is using an accounting software that had a different chart of accounts coding and set up.

Part II: Findings Related to the Financial Statements: (Continued)

FINDING NO. 05-5 - Inadequate Chart of Accounts (Repeated from 2004 - Finding 04-7) (Continued)

The ROE has established its chart of accounts on a grant-by-grant basis using the account coding structure of the software instead of that prescribed by the Illinois Program Accounting Manual and ROE Accounting Manual. The ROE has started to revise its account coding to comply with the Illinois Program Accounting Manual and ROE Accounting Manual but had not completed it in fiscal year 2005.

Auditors' Recommendation:

The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 should utilize the system of accounts promulgated by the Illinois State Board of Education as required by the Illinois Administrative Code and by the ROE Accounting Manual. The ROE should complete the conversion of the existing chart of accounts to the account coding and structure consistent with the ROE Accounting Manual. This would ensure that transactions are recorded and reported consistently across all programs and that revenues are reported according to source.

Management's Response:

We agree with the recommendations. The ROE Accounting Manual will be used to create new titles and expense accounts with the line item, object codes, and funding sources. The PASS and ROE bookkeepers will work together as much as possible to set up their accounts to coincide with each other. However, since they both have their QuickBooks set up in two different ways, this may still remain on a limited basis.

FINDING NO. 05-1 - Controls Over Compliance with Laws and Regulations

Condition:

Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 is not examining all books, accounts, and vouchers of every school treasurer in its educational service area at least once each year. Regional Office officials noted that they believe this mandate is outdated and that they are satisfying the intent of the statute by other reviews they undertake. For example, the Regional Superintendent signs off on the Annual Financial Reports from the school districts in his region. In addition, the Regional Office gets a spreadsheet from the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) that outlines all of the school districts and their audit exceptions, if any. The Regional Office follows up with school districts having exceptions and gets the corrective action and forwards it to ISBE.

While these are reviews involving the finances of school treasurers, they are not in the level of detail required by 105 ILCS 5/3-14.11.

Plan:

The Regional Offices of Education will request that the General Assembly delete 105 ILCS 5/3-14.11 from the statutes and will seek a legislative solution to other obsolete passages.

FINDING NO. 05-2 - Inadequate controls over property and equipment (Repeated from 2004 and 2003 - Finding Nos. 04-3, 03-3)

Condition:

The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 did not have adequate controls over fixed assets.

In our test of fixed assets at the local ROE office, we did not locate two cameras on the fixed assets listing. Upon investigation, it was determined that personnel attending seminars had them, however, the items were not signed out in the log-out sheet.

In our test of fixed assets at the Progressive Alternative Secondary School (PASS) location, we noted the following:

- The fixed assets listing did not have complete information as to the function and activity; reference to the acquisition source document; acquisition date; acquisition cost; vendor; unit charged with custody; location; fund and account from which purchased; and method of acquisition.
- Equipment items were not tagged with fixed asset tag numbers that clearly indicated they were the property of the ROE. Some items had numbers written in permanent ink.

Plan:

A sign-out sheet has been updated to allow for numerous sign-outs. Staff has been informed of the importance of signing-out. Inventory will be tested semi annually to increase control. PASS will obtain permanent labels to be affixed to all equipment. An inventory will be taken annually. In addition, a spreadsheet will be created that includes item descriptions, ID number, funding source, cost, disposal date, reason for disposal and method item was disposed.

Anticipated Date of Completion:

PASS will have items listed and tagged before the end of fiscal year 2006. The ROE has already updated the sign-out sheets.

FINDING NO. 05-3 - Unrecorded and unreconciled bank accounts (Repeated from 2004 and 2003 - Finding Nos. 04-5 and 03-5)

Condition:

During our testing of cash and bank reconciliations, we noted four bank accounts with balances totaling \$125,632 as of June 30, 2005 not recorded in the general ledger. These accounts were opened in prior years and were included in the cash balances reported in the financial statements but the adjustments were not posted in the general ledger.

The bank reconciliation as of June 30, 2005 for one bank account with a bank balance of \$81,198 reflected an unreconciled difference of \$1,378.

Plan:

The ROE will establish QuickBooks accounts for the accounts not currently set-up and recorded. PASS will assign codes using the chart of accounts in the ROE Accounting Manual and track all income and expenses.

Prior to the end of fiscal year 2006.

FINDING NO. 05-4 - Inadequate documentation of salary rates (Repeated from 2004 and 2003 - Finding Nos. 04-6 and 03-6)

Condition:

In our tests of payroll for the PASS Alternative School, we noted that employees did not have employment contracts or formally approved rates of pay. A list of salaries by person is prepared and given to the bookkeeper but the listing does not indicate the person authorizing the salary rates or their effective dates.

Plan:

An excel spreadsheet with all the staff, rates, and effective dates will be established. This will be signed by the Regional Superintendent. Individual staff payroll information will be signed by the staff member and the coordinator. Individual staff files will be established with current monthly payroll information and paperwork indicating additional funds for special work services given to staff.

Prior to the end of fiscal year 2006.

Condition:

The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 maintains its system of accounts based on the grants, awards and contracts (programs) it administers. Programs are not maintained in individual separate self-balancing funds. Instead, programs are set-up as cost centers that track only revenues and expenditures by program. In addition, revenues are accounted for using a single revenue code for each program, without regard to the source of the revenue. We also noted that the account descriptions used and the account coding are not consistent in all funds.

Plan:

The ROE Accounting Manual will be used to create new titles and expense accounts with the line item, object codes, and funding sources. The PASS and ROE bookkeepers will work together as much as possible to set up their accounts to coincide with each other. The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 (ROE No. 27) provides this Management's Discussion and Analysis of its financial statements. This narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities is for the year ended June 30, 2005 with comparative information for the year ended June 30, 2004. Readers are encouraged to consider the information in conjunction with the ROE No. 27's financial statements that follow.

2005 Financial Highlights

- Within the Governmental Funds, the General Fund revenues increased by \$89,756 (31%) from \$290,828 in FY 2004 to \$380,584 in fiscal year 2005. General Fund expenditures increased by \$67,900 (22%) from \$314,015 in FY 2004 to \$381,915 in FY 2005.
- Within the Governmental Funds, the Special Fund revenue increased by \$256,196 (30%) from \$868,046 in FY 2004 to \$1,124,242 in FY 2005. The Special Fund expenditures increased by \$358,625 (46%) from \$781,995 in FY 2004 to \$1,140,620 in FY 2005.
- The Enterprise Fund revenue increased by \$5,037 (8%) from \$65,531 in FY 2004 to \$70,568 in FY 2005. The Enterprise Fund expenditures decreased by \$18,991 (29%) from \$66,600 in FY 2004 to \$47,609 in FY 2005.
- The ROE No. 27 has no long term debt.

Using This Report

This report consists of a series of financial statements and other information, as follows:

- Management's Discussion and Analysis introduces financial statements and provides an analytical overview of the ROE No. 27's financial activities.
- The Government-wide financial statements consist of a Statement of Net Assets and a Statement of Activities. These provide information about the activities of the ROE No. 27 as a whole and present an overall view of the Office's finances.
- Fund financial statements report the ROE No. 27's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements by providing information about the most significant funds.
- Notes to the financial statements provide additional information that is needed for a full understanding of the data provided in the basic financial statements.
- Required supplementary information further explains and supports the financial statements and supplementary information provides detailed information about the non-major funds.

Reporting the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office as a Whole

It is important to note, that many grants are a cooperative effort of the ROE No. 27 and the Rock Island County Regional Office of Education No. 49 and the Bureau/Henry/Stark Regional Office of Education No. 28.

The Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities

The Government-wide statements report information about the ROE No. 27 as a whole. The Statement of Net Assets includes all of the assets and liabilities. All of the current year revenues and expenses are accounted for in the Statement of Activities regardless of when cash is received or paid using Generally Accepted Accounting Principles and GASB 34.

The Government-wide statements report the Office's net assets and how they have changed. Net assets - the difference between assets and liabilities - are one way to measure the Office's financial health or position.

- Over time, increases or decreases in the net assets can be an indicator of whether financial position is improving or deteriorating, respectively.
- To assess the Regional Office's overall health, additional non-financial factors, such as new laws, rules, regulations, and actions by officials at the state level need to be considered.

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide detailed information about the ROE No. 27's funds. Funds are accounting devices that allow the tracking of specific sources of funding and spending on particular programs. Some funds are required by state law. The ROE No. 27 established other funds to control and manage money for particular purposes.

The Office has three kinds of funds:

(1) Governmental funds account for those funds through which most governmental functions of the Office are financed. These focus on how cash and other financial assets that can be readily converted to cash flow in and out and the balances left at the year-end that are available for spending. Consequently, the governmental fund statements provide a detailed short-term view that helps determine whether there are more or fewer resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the Office's programs. The Office's Governmental Funds include: the General Fund and the Special Revenue Fund.

HENDERSON, MERCER AND WARREN COUNTIES REGIONAL OFFICE OF EDUCATION NO. 27 MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS JUNE 30, 2005

The governmental funds required financial statements include a Balance Sheet and a Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances.

- (2) <u>Proprietary funds</u> account for resources from fees charged directly to those entities or individuals that use its services. Proprietary fund statements provide both long-term and short-term financial information consistent with the focus provided by government-wide financial statements. The proprietary funds required financial statements include a Statement of Net Assets, Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Fund Net Assets and Statement of Cash Flows.
- (3) <u>Fiduciary funds</u> are used to account for assets held by the ROE No. 27 in a trust capacity or as an agent for individuals and private or governmental organizations. These funds are custodial in nature (assets equal liabilities) and do not involve measurement of results of operations. The fiduciary funds required financial statements include a Statement of Fiduciary Net Assets.

Government-Wide Financial Analysis

As noted earlier, net assets may serve when examined over time as one indicator of the financial position of the ROE No. 27. The net assets at the end of FY 2005 totaled \$315,624. At the end of FY 2004, the net assets were \$310,374. The analysis that follows provides a summary of the ROE No. 27's net assets as of June 30.

The ROE No. 27's net assets increased by \$5,250 (2%) from FY 2004. There had been no significant changes in revenues and expenses in fiscal year 2005.

Governmental Activities

Revenues for governmental activities were \$1,504,826 and expenses were \$1,522,535. The County Budget is kept in a savings account and withdrawn as needed. A withdrawal was made from the Illinois Prime Funds Account amounting to \$20,000. This was distributed to the Distributive Account, Staff Development, ROE No. 27 and Institute Fund for \$5,000 to each fund.

Financial Analysis of the ROE No. 27 Funds

As previously noted, the ROE No. 27 uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. The Agency's Governmental Funds reported combined fund balances were \$293,734.

Governmental Fund Highlights

- The dollar return on investments (certificate of deposit, short-term investments and interest earned on a float), were reduced because of the low interest rates.
- Funds were drawn down from the Illinois Prime Funds and the Warren County Teachers' Credit Union. They were distributed to the original depositing grant/fund. These funds were needed for additional expenses not covered by grants held by the ROE.

• The County Budget was left at the same amount as before. Certain line items were removed or reduced to accommodate the County's request for an increase in rent. However, the total budget remained the same as the previous year.

Proprietary Fund Highlights

Total proprietary fund net assets increased by \$22,959 (2,148%). The net increase in the proprietary funds revenues and expenses is due to increase in workshop activities.

Fiduciary Fund Highlights

There was a decrease of \$8,214 (10%) in total fiduciary funds for FY 2005. Transactions during FY 2005 represent mainly transfers in and out of funds for the Distributive Fund.

Budgetary Highlights

The ROE No. 27 annually adopts budgets for several funds. The Regional Superintendent annually prepares an Office Operations Budget and submits it to the County Boards for their approval. The Office Operations Budget covers a fiscal year which runs from December 1 to November 30. All grant budgets are prepared by the Regional Office of Education No. 27 and submitted to the granting agency for approval. Amendments must be submitted under guidelines established by the granting agency.

Capital Assets

ROE No. 27's capital assets include office equipment, computers, audio-visual equipment, and building improvements. The ROE No. 27 maintains an inventory of capital assets which have been accumulated over time. The ROE No. 27 adopted a capitalization and depreciation threshold of \$5,000 for GASB 34. As of June 30, 2005, there were no assets costing \$5,000 or more.

Economic Factors and Next Years' Budget

At the time these financial statements were prepared and audited, the ROE No. 27 was aware of several existing circumstances that could affect its financial condition in the future:

- The ROE received a new Early Childhood Block Grant of \$275,000 for FY 2006.
- The interest rate on investments remains low and will impact interest earned.
- Most grants have remained near or at previous levels with exception of the Even Start Grant had a \$10,000 reduction for the FY 2006 school year.
- County Board support for ROE No. 27 remains the same for FY 2006.

- Several pieces of equipment (i.e. computers, copier and printers) will need to be replaced.
- The ROE, at the end of FY 2005, requested that all districts rescind their agreement for their funds to be directly deposited into the ROE account. Each district now has all of their funds directly deposited into their bank accounts. The ROE only receives PASS funds and the grants the ROE holds, such as Even Start and Early Childhood Block Grants. This will reduce the amount of interest received for the Distributive Account.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. Reporting Entity

The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 operates under the School Code (Articles 3 and 3A of <u>Illinois Compiled Statutes</u>, Chapter 105). This encompasses Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties, Illinois. The Regional Superintendent of Schools (Superintendent) serves as chief administrative officer of the Regional Office of Education No. 27 and is elected pursuant to Article 3 of <u>Illinois Compiled Statutes</u>, Chapter 105. The principal financial duty of the Superintendent is to receive and distribute monies due to school districts from general state aid, state categorical grants, and various other sources.

The basic financial statements include all funds of Regional Office of Education No. 27.

These are the only activities considered to be part of (controlled by or dependent on) the Regional Office of Education No. 27, as determined by the application of the criteria set forth in Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 14, The Financial Reporting Entity. The criteria for inclusion of an entity include, but are not limited to, legal standing, fiscal dependency, imposition of will and potential for financial benefit or burden.

Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 has determined that no other outside agency meets any of the above criteria and, therefore, no other agency has been included as a component unit in the financial statements. Furthermore, the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 does not consider itself to be a component unit of any other entity.

B. Government-wide and fund financial statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e. the Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities) report information on all of the non-fiduciary activities of the primary government. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements. The statements distinguish between those activities of the ROE that are governmental in nature and those that are considered business-type activities. Governmental activities normally are supported by operating grants and contributions, charges for services and intergovernmental revenues. Business-type activities normally are supported by amounts assessed or received from local sources for the ROE programs.

The Statement of Activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment are offset by program revenues. *Direct expenses* are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. *Program revenues* include (1) charges to users who purchase, use or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment, and (2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as *general revenues*. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

Certain 2004 amounts have been reclassified to conform to the 2005 presentation. The Staff Development and Criminal Background Investigation fund activities were previously classified and reported in the General Fund and are currently classified and reported as proprietary funds.

C. Change in Accounting Principles

Effective July 1, 2004, the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 adopted GASB Statement No. 40, *Deposits and Investment Risk Disclosures*, an amendment of GASB Statement No. 3. This new standard enhances the deposit and investment risk disclosures by updating the custodial credit risk disclosure requirements of GASB Statement No. 3 and addressing other common risks, including concentration of credit risk, interest rate risk and foreign currency risk. The implementation did not have a significant impact on the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's financial statements.

D. Measurement focus and basis of accounting

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting, as are the proprietary fund financial statements. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Grants and similar revenues are recognized as soon all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund and fiduciary financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when they are both measurable and available. "Measurable" means the amount of the transaction can be determined and "available" means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the

current period. Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 considers revenues as available if they are collected within 60 days after yearend. Expenses are generally recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. In applying the susceptible to accrual concept to intergovernmental revenues, the legal and contractual requirements of the numerous individual programs are used as guidance.

There are, however, essentially two types of these revenues. In one, monies must be expended on the specific purpose or project before any amounts will be paid; therefore, revenues are recognized based upon the expenditures recorded. In the other, monies are virtually unrestricted as to purpose of expenditure and are usually revocable only for failure to comply with prescribed compliance requirements. These resources are reflected as revenues at the time of receipt or earlier if the susceptible to accrual criteria are met.

Private-sector standards of accounting and financial reporting issued prior to December 1, 1989, generally are followed in both the government-wide and proprietary fund financial statements to the extent that those standards do not conflict with or contradict the guidance of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board.

The proprietary fund distinguishes *operating* revenues and expenses from *nonoperating* items. Operating revenues and expenses generally result from providing services and producing and delivering goods in connection with a proprietary fund's principal ongoing operations.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the ROE's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

E. Basis of presentation - Fund Accounting

The accounts are organized on the basis of funds, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund balance, revenue, and expenditures. The resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are summarized by type in the financial statements. The following summarizes the fund types and account groups used:

Governmental Fund Types

Governmental Funds are those through which most governmental functions are financed. The acquisition, use and balances of the expendable financial resources and the related

current liabilities are accounted for through Governmental Funds. The Governmental Funds include the following:

General Fund - to account for resources traditionally associated with government which are not required, legally or by sound financial management, to be accounted for in another fund.

<u>Special Revenue Funds</u> - to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than those accounted for in the Fiduciary Funds) that are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes. The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 reported the following special revenue funds as major governmental funds:

Education Fund - to account for grant money from the following sources:

<u>Teen Reach - Department of Human Services (DHS)</u> - to account for monies received for, and payment of expenditures for, the Teen Reach program. This program consists of educational, recreational and vocational activities designed to improve youth's chances for success.

<u>Title I - Reading First Part B SEA Funds</u> - to account for funds received to provide assistance to school districts in establishing reading programs for students in kindergarten through third grade that are based on scientific reading research. Reading First also focuses on teacher development and ensuring that all teachers, including special education teachers, have the tools they need to effectively help their students learn to read.

<u>Even Start - Statewide Family Literacy Program</u> - to account for the grant monies received for, and payment of, expenditures incurred for the Even Start Grant.

Even Start - Local - to account for the local grant monies received for, and payment of, expenditures incurred for the Even Start program.

<u>Child and Adult Care Food Program</u> - to account for the grant monies received for, and payment of, expenditures incurred for Child and Adult Care Food Program.

<u>McDonough/Hancock ROE Homeless Grant</u> - to account for the grant monies received for, and payment of, expenditures incurred for the Homeless Grant from the McDonough/Hancock ROE.

<u>Bureau/Henry/Stark ROE Century 21 Grant</u> - to account for the grant monies received for, and payment of, expenditures incurred for the 21st Century Learning Centers Grant from the Bureau/Henry/Stark ROE.

<u>KIDS Standards Aligned Classroom</u> - to account for the grant monies received for, and payment of, expenditures incurred for the KIDS Standards Aligned Classroom.

<u>High Roads Youth Program</u> - to account for the grant monies received for, and payment of, expenditures incurred for the High Roads Youth Program.

<u>Progressive Alternative Secondary School (P.A.S.S.)</u> - to account for the administration of monies used for the following sources:

General State Aid - to account for the administration of monies to be received for, and payment of, expenditures for the Progressive Alternative Secondary School.

Adult Education and Family Literacy - State Basic - to account for grant monies received for, and payment of, expenditures incurred for students in high school, General Educational Development, and computer classes with high reading level.

<u>Adult Education and Family Literacy - State Performance</u> - to account for grant monies for formula-driven rewards for successful completion of the program.

<u>Adult Education and Family Literacy - Public Assistance</u> - to account for grant monies received from the Department of Human Services for expenditures incurred for educational services given for students on public assistance.

<u>Regional Safe Schools</u> - to account for the administration of monies to be used for the Regional Safe Schools Program Fund by the Illinois State Board of Education.

<u>Title V - Innovative Program</u> - to account for grant monies received and expenditures for Title V - Innovative Program.

<u>Title IV - Safe and Drug Free Schools - Formula</u> - to account for grant monies received and expenditures for the drug prevention program.

<u>Federal Adult Education - Basic</u> - used to account for federal grant monies received for, and payment of, education and literacy for adults.

<u>Title II - Teacher Quality</u> - to account for grant monies received for, and payment of, expenditures for the training and course work of Regional Safe School teachers to improve instruction in the classroom.

<u>State Free Lunch and Breakfast</u> - to account for grant monies received for, and payment of, expenditures for the State Free Lunch and Breakfast program.

<u>National School Lunch Program</u> - to account for grant monies received for, and payment of, expenditures for the National School Lunch program.

<u>School Breakfast Program</u> - to account for grant monies received for, and payment of, expenditures for the School Breakfast program.

<u>School Breakfast Incentive</u> - to account for grant monies received for, and payment of, expenditures for the School Breakfast Incentive program.

<u>Illinois Violence Prevention Act (IVPA) Mini-Grant</u> - to account for funds received from IVPA to provide community awareness, coordination and training to impede family violence.

Other Non-Major Funds

The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 reported the following special revenue funds as non-major governmental programs:

<u>Institute</u> - to account for fees collected for the registration and renewal of teaching certificates. These fees are used to defray administrative expenses incidental to teachers' institutes, workshops, or meetings of a professional nature that are designed to promote the professional growth of teachers or for the purpose of defraying the expense of any general or special meeting of teachers or school personnel.

General Education Development (GED) - to account for the revenues and expenditures associated with the processing of applications for the high school level GED test and the issuance of diplomas upon successful completion of the examination.

<u>Bus Driver Training</u> - to account for the stewardship of the assets held in trust in connection with the Bus Driver Training Program.

American College Test (ACT) Class - to account for the administration of classes to prepare students for the ACT.

<u>Education Administration</u> - to account for the stewardship of the assets held in trust per agreement with the Boards of Education of the local school districts on the use of interest earnings earned from temporary investment of distributive funds.

<u>Supervisory Expense</u> - to account for resources accumulated for, and the payment of, expenditures incurred in providing supervisory services.

Proprietary Fund Types

<u>Enterprise Funds</u> - used to account for resources from fees charged directly to those entities or individuals that use the services of the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27. This consists mainly of monies received for, and payment of, expenditures for workshops and other services for the school districts.

<u>Staff Development</u> - to account for local revenues and disbursements related to the development of staff.

<u>Criminal Background Investigation</u> - to account for the assessments received from the school districts to pay for the processing of background checks of substitute teachers and expenditures incurred providing this service to the school districts.

Fiduciary Fund Type

Fiduciary Funds are used to account for assets held in a trustee capacity or as an agent for individuals or private or governmental organizations. The Fiduciary Funds include the following:

Agency Funds - custodial in nature (assets equal liabilities) and do not involve measurement of operations. The agency funds include the following:

<u>Distributive</u> - to account for funds received and disbursed as a result of the Superintendent's responsibility to receive and distribute to treasurers of school districts and other agencies, monies due to them from general state aid, state categorical grants, and various other sources.

ROE No. 27 Grant Program - a convenience clearing account for certain expenditures shared between Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 and other entities sharing the same office building.

F. Interest Revenue

Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) funds received by the ROE for the Distributive Fund accrue interest for the period of time between the receipt of the funds and clearance of checks to the recipient. In accordance with an agreement dated May 24, 1988 with the school district boards served, interest earned on Distributive Fund deposits is transferred to the General Fund to offset wire service and other bank charges incurred by the Distributive Fund.

Distributive Fund interest earned and related charges are recognized as revenues and expenditures in the general fund.

G. License and Permits

License and permit revenues are recognized in the year for which the licenses or permits are issued. Teacher certification revenues are recognized over a five year period when applicable.

H. Revenues - Exchange and Non-exchange Transactions

Revenue resulting from exchange transactions, in which each party gives and receives essentially equal value, is recorded on the accrual basis when the exchange takes place. On a modified accrual basis, revenue is recorded in the fiscal year in which the resources are measurable and become available.

Non-exchange transactions, in which the ROE receives value without directly giving value in return, includes grants and donations. On an accrual basis, revenue from grants and donations is recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied. Eligibility requirements include timing requirements, which specify the year when the resources are required to be used or the fiscal year when use is first permitted, matching requirements, in which the ROE must provide local resources to be used for specific purpose, and expenditure requirements, in which the resources are provided to the ROE on a reimbursement basis. On a modified accrual basis, revenue from non-exchange transactions must be available before it can be recognized.

I. Capital Assets

Capital assets result from expenditures in the governmental funds. These assets are reported in the governmental activities column of the government-wide Statement of Net Assets but are not reported in the fund financial statements.

Capital assets are recorded at cost at time of acquisition or fair value at the date of donation. The ROE capitalizes items costing \$5,000 or more. Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives (three to forty years) of the respective assets.

As of June 30, 2005, there were no items costing \$5,000 or more.

J. Deferred Revenues

The ROE reports unearned deferred revenue in the governmental fund Balance Sheet. Deferred and unearned revenue arises when potential revenue does not meet both the measurable and available criteria for recognition in the current period.

K. Net Assets

Net assets present the difference between assets and liabilities in the Statement of Net Assets. Net assets of the ROE are classified as follows:

Invested in Capital Assets - represents the ROE's total investment in capital assets. There were no items meeting the capitalization threshold of \$5,000 as of June 30, 2005.

Unrestricted net assets - represent resources used for transactions relating to the general operations of the ROE and may be used at the discretion of management to meet expenses for any purpose.

L. Management Estimates

The preparation of financial statements, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets, liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, as well as the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

M. Investments and Cash Accounts

State regulations require that the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 deposit funds under its control into accounts insured by the federal government, secured by substantial collateral or into pooled investment trusts. All funds not needed for immediate disbursements are maintained in interest bearing accounts. Statutes authorize the Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 to make deposits or invest in obligation of states and their political subdivisions, savings accounts, credit union shares, repurchase agreements, commercial paper rated within the three highest classifications by at least two standard rating services, and the Illinois Public Treasurer's Investment Pool.

N. Revenues from Federal and State Grants

Revenues from federal and State grant awards are recorded net of the amount due to the State for the unused portion of the grant or the amount carried over to the following fiscal year project. Amounts due to the State or carried over to the following year project are recorded as liabilities.

O. Budgets and Budgetary Accounting

Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 did not formally adopt a budget for the year ended June 30, 2005 and is not legally required to do so. The Illinois State Board of Education requires budgets for certain State and Federal programs. These budgets were used to prepare the Budgetary Comparison Schedules for the following programs: Teen Reach - Department of Human Services, Title I - Reading First Part B SEA Funds, Even Start - Statewide Family Literacy Program, Adult Education and Family Literacy - State Performance, Adult Education and Family Literacy - Public Assistance, Regional Safe Schools, Title V - Innovative Programs, Title IV - Safe and Drug Free Schools Formula, Federal Adult Education - Basic and Title II - Teacher Quality.

NOTE 2 - INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT

Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 entered into an Intergovernmental Agreement with Rock Island Regional Office of Education No. 49 executed pursuant to the provisions of the Intergovernmental Cooperation Clause of the Illinois Constitution as well as the provisions of the Intergovernmental Cooperation Act of 1973 and the Illinois Admin. Code 525.110.

NOTE 3 - CASH AND INVESTMENTS

The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 utilizes several different bank accounts for its various activities. The book balance of such accounts is \$364,675 at June 30, 2005, while the bank balance was \$518,545. The difference between the above amounts primarily represents checks that have been issued but have not yet cleared the bank as of June 30, 2005.

Custodial credit risk for deposits exists when, in the event of the failure of a depository financial institution, the ROE's deposits may not be recovered. Originally, GASB Statement No. 3 discussed three categories of custodial credit risk as follows:

Category 1 includes deposits covered by depository insurance or collateral held by Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 in its name.

Category 2 includes deposits covered by collateral held by the financial institutions in a pledged safekeeping account in the name of Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27.

Category 3 includes deposits which are uncollateralized or the collateral is held by the financial institution trust department but not in the name of Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27.

The ROE's deposits are covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) and by collateral held by the financial institution in the ROE's name. Although deposit balances classified under the traditional risk categories 1 and 2 have been determined under GASB Statement No. 40 to be exposed to only minimal risk, and, based on this conclusion, the GASB chose to limit disclosure of custodial credit risk to deposits that meet the definition of "Category 3", the ROE has decided to include categories 1 and 2 in the discussion. The following table reflects the ROE's level of risk as of June 30, 2005:

The exempt funds are those deposited into the Illinois Funds.

Interest Rate Risk is the risk that changes in interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. Generally, the longer the maturity of an investment, the greater the sensitivity of its fair value to changes in market interest rates. The ROE's policy for reducing its exposure to the risk is to structure the ROE's portfolio so that securities mature to meet the ROE's cash requirements for ongoing operations. The ROE's investments as of June 30, 2005 are limited to the investment in the State investment pool (Illinois Funds).

Credit Risk is the risk that an issuer or other counterparty to an investment will not fulfill its obligations. The ROE's policy for managing its exposure to the risk is to limit investments to those allowable by the Illinois Public Funds Investment Act. As of June 30, 2005, the ROE's investment in the State investment pool (Illinois Funds) was rated AAAm by Standard & Poor's.

NOTE 4 - INTEREST ON DISTRIBUTIVE FUND

Interest earned on distributive fund receipts is recorded in the General Fund by the consent of all affected school boards and other entities. Per agreement with the Boards of Education of the local school districts included under Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's jurisdiction, they are to utilize interest earnings on temporary investments of distributive funds for the mutual benefit of all the local agencies. The interest monies are deposited to the Education Administration Special Revenue Fund and at the direction of the Regional Superintendent are expended for the mutual benefit of all local agencies.

NOTE 6 - EMPLOYEE BENEFIT PLAN

The Henderson, Mercer, and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's defined benefit pension plan, Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (IMRF), provides retirement, disability, annual cost of living adjustments and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. IMRF acts as a common investment and administrative agent for local governments and school districts in Illinois. The Illinois Pension Code establishes the benefit provisions of the plan that can only be amended by the Illinois General Assembly.

IMRF issues a financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. The report may be obtained at www.imrf.org/pubs/pubs-homepage.htm or by writing to the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund, 2211 York Road, Suite 500, Oak Brook, Illinois 60523.

Employees participating in IMRF are required to contribute 4.50 percent of their annual covered salary. The member rate is established by state statute. The Henderson, Mercer and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 is required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. The employer rate for calendar year 2004 was 9.30 percent of payroll. The employer contribution requirements are established and may be amended by the IMRF Board of Trustees. IMRF's unfunded actuarial accrued liability is being amortized as a level percentage of projected payroll on a closed basis (overfunded liability amortized on open basis). The amortization period at December 31, 2004 was 5 years.

For December 31, 2004, the Henderson, Mercer, and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's annual pension cost of \$21,995 was equal to the Henderson, Mercer, and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's required and actual contributions. The required contribution was determined as part of the December 31, 2002 actuarial valuation using the entry age actuarial cost method. The actuarial assumptions included (a) 7.50% investment rate of return (net of administrative expenses), (b) projected salary increases of 4.00% a year, attributable to inflation, (c) additional projected salary increases ranging from 0.4% to 11.6% per year depending on age and service, attributable to seniority/merit, and (d) post-retirement benefit increases of 3% annually. The actuarial value of IMRF assets was determined using techniques that smooth the effects of short-term volatility in the market value of investments over a five-year period with a 15% corridor. The assumptions used for the 2004 actuarial valuation were based on the 1999-2001 experience study.

NOTE 7 - RETIREMENT PLANS

Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois

The Henderson, Mercer, and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 participates in the Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois (TRS). TRS is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan that was created by the Illinois legislature for the benefit of Illinois public school teachers employed outside the city of Chicago.

The Illinois Pension Code outlines the benefit provisions of TRS, and amendments to the plan can be made only by legislative action with the Governor's approval. The State of Illinois maintains primary responsibility for the funding of the plan, but contributions from participating employers and members are also required. The TRS Board of Trustees is responsible for the system's administration.

TRS members include all active nonannuitants who are employed by a TRS-covered employer to provide services for which teacher certification is required. Active TRS members are required to contribute 9 percent of their creditable earnings. These contributions, which may be paid on behalf of employees by the employer, are submitted to TRS by the employer.

In addition, virtually all members pay a contribution to the Teachers' Health Insurance Security (THIS) Fund, a separate fund in the State Treasury that is not a part of this

retirement plan. The member THIS Fund health insurance contribution was 0.75 percent during the year ended June 30, 2005.

The State of Illinois makes contributions directly to TRS on behalf of the Henderson, Mercer, and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27's TRS-covered employees.

• On behalf Contributions. The State of Illinois makes employer pension contributions on behalf of the Henderson, Mercer, and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27. For the year ended June 30, 2005, State of Illinois contributions were based on 11.76 percent of creditable earnings, and the Henderson, Mercer, and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 recognized revenue and expenditures of \$23,713 in pension contributions that the State of Illinois paid directly to TRS. For the years ended June 30, 2004 and June 30, 2003, the State of Illinois contribution rates as percentages of creditable earnings were 13.98 percent (\$17,956) and 13.01 percent (\$25,977), respectively.

The Henderson, Mercer, and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 makes three other types of employer contributions directly to TRS.

- 2.2 Formula Contributions. For the years ended June 30, 2005, and June 30, 2004, employers were required to contribute 0.58 percent of creditable earnings as the employer share of the 2.2 formula change. Contributions for the years ended June 30, 2005, and June 30, 2004, were \$1,170 and \$1,157, respectively. For the year ended June 30, 2003, part of the employer's 2.2 formula contribution (0.58 percent of pay) was reduced as a result of a new employer THIS Fund contribution for retiree health insurance (0.4 percent of pay). The remaining 0.18 percent was submitted to TRS. Contributions for the year ended June 30, 2003 were \$1,158.
- Federal and trust fund contributions. When TRS members are paid from federal and trust funds administered by the Henderson, Mercer, and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27, there is a statutory requirement for the Henderson, Mercer, and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 to pay an additional contribution that is currently 10.5 percent of salaries paid from those funds. For the year ended June 30, 2005, salaries totaling \$286 were paid from federal and trust funds that required employer contributions of \$30. For the years ended June 30, 2004 and June 30, 2003, required Henderson, Mercer, and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 contributions were \$372 and \$549, respectively.
- Early Retirement Option. The Henderson, Mercer, and Warren Counties Regional Office of Education No. 27 is also required to make one-time employer contributions to TRS for members who retired under the Early Retirement Option. The payments vary

depending on the age and salary of the member. No member or employer contributions are required if the member has 34 years of service. The maximum employer payment of 100 percent of the member's highest salary used in the calculation of final average salary is required if the member is 55 years old. For the years ended June 30, 2005 and June 30, 2004, there were no salaries that qualified for this plan.

Changes

Public Act 94-0004, which was signed into law on June 1, 2005, contained a number of provisions affecting employer and active member contributions. Most will not be effective or impact financial statements until the year ending June 30, 2006. The changes are summarized below:

- Active member contributions. The active member contribution rate will increase from
 the current 9.0 percent of creditable earnings to 9.4 percent beginning July 1, 2005. The
 increase is to help cover the cost of the new ERO program and will be refunded if the
 member does not retire under ERO.
- State/federal contributions. Under a policy adopted by the Board of Trustees before Public Act 94-0004 was enacted, the employer contribution rate for employees paid from federal funds will be the same as the rate paid by the state. Under Public Act 94-0004, the state contribution rate in FY 2006 was reduced to 7.06 percent of pay. Therefore, the employer contribution rate for employees paid from federal funds in FY 2006 will be 7.06 percent, a decrease from the current 10.50 percent.

New employer contributions.

- > Salary increases over 6 percent. If employers grant salary increases in excess of 6 percent that are used in final average salary calculations, the employer will make a lump-sum contribution to TRS to cover the cost of the portion of the benefit due to salary increases over 6 percent. Public Act 94-0004 exempts salary increases granted under contracts and collective bargaining agreements in effect on June 1, 2005.
- > Sick leave in excess of normal allotment. If employers grant sick leave near retirement in excess of the normal allotment and that sick leave is counted as service credit, the employer will make a lump-sum contribution to TRS. The act exempts sick leave granted under contracts and collective bargaining agreements in effect on June 1, 2005.
- Early Retirement Option. In addition to the changes described above, the following changes were made to ERO:
 - > Both active member and employer ERO contribution rates are increased. For employers, the maximum contribution increases from the current 100 percent of the

member's highest salary used in the calculation of final average salary to 117.5 percent.

- > The waiver of member and employer ERO contributions when the member has 34 years of service ended with the program that expired June 30, 2005.
- A "Pipeline ERO" program is provided for members to retire under the same terms as the ERO program that expired June 30, 2005, provided they meet certain conditions and retire on or before July 1, 2007.
- > Public Act 94-0004 provides for a review of the member and employer ERO contributions every five years to ensure that the program is revenue neutral.

TRS financial information, an explanation of TRS' benefits, and descriptions of member, employer, and state funding requirements can be found in the *TRS Comprehensive Annual Financial Report* for the year ended June 30, 2004. The report for the year ended June 30, 2005 is expected to be available in late 2005. The reports may be obtained by writing to the Teacher's Retirement System of the State of Illinois, P.O. Box 19253, 2815 West Washington Street, Springfield, Illinois 62794-9253. The most current report is also available on the TRS website at trs.illinois.gov.
